### Four Challenges of Urban Governance

**Empowerment** 

Limited, overlapping & fragmented functional assignments with inappropriate/excessive central/state/provincial control

Resources

Financial basis extremely weak: limited revenue powers and inappropriately conceived/targeted intergovernmental transfers

Accountability

Despite elections, accountability mechanisms are weak and underutilized

Delivery

Provide & maintain municipal services, networks


### Municipal Finances - A Learning Program for Local Governments

### Mumbai Region, December 2013

- Collaborating with Metropolitan Region
   Development Authority (MMRDA) the Metro
   Lab focused on 3 interrelated themes for the
   preparation of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Regional Plan:
- (i) Regional Information Systems for Planning and Decision Making;
- (ii) Regional Land Use and Development for Equitable and Sustainable Urbanization; and
- (iii) Institutions, Finance, and Implementation
   Strategies for Regional Development.



# Seoul, May 2014 "Think outside your Boundary"

- Key discussions focused on:
- Plans need to be implementable and integrated, by clearly recognizing the challenges, and outcomes need to be measured.
- Land Markets need to be monitored and managed in order to capture value and ensure sustainable urban growth.
- Transport and land-use need to be seamless. The value created by transport investment in urban areas can quickly dissipate if landuses around the transport facility are not fostered.
- Inter-jurisdictional coordination is critical. Multiple institutional model for coordination can work as long it establishes a shared vision for the metropolitan area so identifying clear priorities for the city through a participatory process holds the key to success
