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Worldwide almost 1/3 of all women who have been in a relationship have experienced partner violence

Development Costs of Violence

Adverse consequences for women themselves, families and the economy

- Health: increased risk of depression, STI, HIV, unintended pregnancy
- Work: higher absenteeism, lower productivity
- Intergenerational: children exposed have worse health, lower education and professional attainment
 - Much higher risk of being victims of violence or perpetrators

Development Costs cont.

Estimated costs are close to average government spending on primary education



Economic empowerment and exposure to gender-based violence

In Bangladesh, working increased women's exposure to IPV:

 BUT only for women who had less education or were married at a young age

In Ecuador, cash transfers to mothers decreased psychological partner violence against women - IF they had above primary

education

- BUT increased such violence against women with a primary education or less

Overlapping Constraints

Overlapping deprivations compound development challenges

Investing in evidence and data

New results of the first ever global systematic review of reviews of what works to prevent violence

- Evidence from 186 impact evaluations in 25 countries
- 80 percent from the Global North

enGENDER IMPACT

- Building understanding about what works, and doesn't work, to expand economic opportunities
- Some with violence outcomes key findings
 - Target norms and attitudes
 - Facilitate social interactions and create safe spaces
 - Engage men and boys
 - Longer interventions are more effective

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The mond bank established the Umbrella Facility for Gender Equality to strengthen awareness, knowledge, and capacity for gender-informed policy-making As part of this effort enGENDER IMPACT provides an online resource point to share knowledge gained from World Bank-supported evaluations on what works, and what doesn't, for gender equality and women's empowerment.

- Invest in multisectoral response
- Promote effective application of laws
- Invest in primary prevention
- Eliminate barriers to women seeking services
- Improve quality and availability of services for survivors
