

Why Girls in Liberia?

- Out of the world's 130 million out-of-school youth, 70 percent are girls
- 30% of all 15-24 females in Liberia have experienced physical violence
- Literacy rates for women continue to fall behind young men even in urban areas—63% versus 85% (1/3 of women outside Monrovia cannot read)
- 2 in 5 girls in Liberia are married before they turn 18
- When women and girls earn income, they reinvest 90% t of it into their families, as compared to only 30 to 40 percent for a man



EPAG Round 1 & Round 2

- 2,491 girls benefited from the EPAG program (30 % Job Training & 70% Business Development Support)
- IRC/EDUCARE/CAP provided BDS part of project
 - 6 months business and life skills training
 - 6 months follow up
- Project components
 - Bank account and stipends
 - Training groups
 - Mentors
 - Market Fairs

- Day care
- Business plan competitions
- Completion bonuses for girls



EPAG Life Skills

 Mixed financial literacy & life skills curricula (6 months, 11 Units)

- Mixed methods talk and chalk, group work, field trips guest speakers, learning while doing
- Ongoing mentoring with women in the community (both focused on business but also personal issues)
- Training group support





EPAG Round 3 – Being Implemented Now

• 1,000 Beneficiaries – 815 BDS & 185 Job Skills

- IRC/EDUCARE/Nael
 - Moving into Grand Bassa
 - 4 months training 5 months follow up
- Project components
 - Savings match
 - Strict age targets
 - Lower literacy targets
 - Research on program for boys

EPAG Lessons Learned

- Adjustments made for "low no literacy" girls still need improvements
- Challenges in capturing soft skills changes in the impact evaluation
- More emphasis on workplace behaviors, job readiness needed
- More emphasis on the building blocks to making good decisions about health, safety etc.
- More layered approach
 build knowledge, apply knowledge, process knowledge



IRC Life Skills Programming & Research

 Isolating mentoring effectiveness and targeting younger girls with SOS program

 Testing a package of support including cash grants with Girl Empower

- Non-cognitive measure research in Burundi
- Further infuse social emotion learning and competency development - push the definition of life skills
- Research around the effect of economic interventions on well being
